Saints of the Day:

Sts. Louis and Zelig Martin



Louis Martin (1823-1894) was a watchmaker by trade who was drawn to the spiritual life. He settled down in Alencon, a small city in France. At twenty-two, young Louis sought to enter religious life, but the Abbot of the monastery insisted that Louis learn Latin. His most determined efforts failed and Louis had to abandon his hopes for the monastic life. Zelig Guerin (1831-1877) was born into a military family. She described her childhood and youth as "dismal." Her mother and father showed her little affection. As a young lady, she sought unsuccessfully to enter the religious order of the sisters of the Hotel-Dieu. Zelig then learned the Alencon lace-making technique and soon mastered this painstaking craft. Richly talented, creative, eager, and endowed with common sense, she started her own business and became quite successful. Louis and Zelig eventually met in Alencon, and married on July 13, 1858. They had nine children, but only 5 girls survived to adulthood. The youngest, Marie-Francoise-Therese Martin, would later be known as St. Therese, the "Little Flower."
